WHEREAS Brantford has a long tradition of sporting excellence through hosting and servicing hundreds of local, regional and provincial tournaments and events annually; and

WHEREAS the City of Brantford was officially recognized as the "Tournament Capital of Ontario" in the Provincial Legislature on June 4, 1998; and

WHEREAS the City of Brantford's Economic Development, Tourism & Cultural Initiatives Department (Tourism Division) has identified sport tourism as a core target market since 2013; and

WHERAS the City of Brantford's *Sport Tourism Strategy* (2019) aspires to a vision that Brantford will be a leading sport tourism destination in structure, supports and execution as the Tournament Capital of Ontario;

WHEREAS the Brantford Police Service have been awarded a bid to host the 2025 Special Olympics Ontario Summer Games in Brantford on July 10-13, 2025; and

WHEREAS the Special Olympics Ontario Summer Games will welcome 900 athletes along with their families and support workers to the City of Brantford; and

WHEREAS the mission of Special Olympics Ontario is dedicated to enriching the lives of Ontarians with an intellectual disability through sport; and

WHEREAS the City of Brantford's Inclusive Community Plan aims to promote opportunities to support diversity, inclusion and developing a community in which every person feels safe and welcome.

#### NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED

- A. THAT the following administration costs to support the events BE FUNDED from the Council Priorities Reserve (RF0558) to a maximum of \$50,000:
  - i. Waiving facility and field rental fees
  - ii. Recovering the value of golf green fees and cart rental fees
  - iii. Waiving any permit fees required to execute the event

- iv. Preparing John Wright Soccer Complex and Kiwanis
   Field for the events including painting lines and additional grass cutting
- v. Administering renting, staffing and cleaning the Quench Buggy or costs associated with an alternative solution
- vi. Renting any waste containers or large garbage bins/dumpster at John Wright Soccer Complex for the event including pickup and dumping fees
- vii. Renting up to five (5) portable washrooms and two (2) hand wash stations per site that do not have adequate washroom facilities in place for attendees
- viii. Renting a shipping container at John Wright Soccer Complex for overnight storage or find a suitable location for storage of equipment or other materials for the duration of the event
- ix. Fees associated with advertising the event on City buses
- B. THAT staff from the Communications, Community Engagement and Customer Service Department BE DIRECTED to design advertisements; and
- C. THAT interested City of Brantford staff BE PERMITTED to volunteer for the 2025 Special Olympics Ontario Summer Games where operationally feasible during regular working hours; and
- D. THAT the Director of Economic Development, Tourism & Cultural Initiatives Department BE DIRECTED to execute a sponsorship agreement between Special Olympics Ontario and The Corporation of the City of Brantford to outline roles and responsibilities for each party in a form satisfactory to the City Solicitor or designate.

# 12.2.9 Request the Redistribution of the Provincial Land Transfer Tax and GST to Municipalities for Sustainable Infrastructure Funding - Councillor Sullivan

WHEREAS municipalities face growing infrastructure needs, including roads, bridges, public transit, water systems, and other critical services, which are essential to community well-being and economic development; and

WHEREAS the current sources of municipal revenue, including property taxes and user fees, are insufficient to meet these increasing demands for infrastructure investment; and

WHEREAS the Province of Ontario currently collects the Land Transfer Tax (LTT) on property transactions in municipalities across the province, generating significant revenue that is not directly shared with municipalities; and

WHEREAS the Federal Government collects the Goods and Services Tax (GST) on property transactions, a portion of which could be directed to municipalities to address local infrastructure needs; and

WHEREAS redistributing a portion of the Provincial Land Transfer Tax and GST to municipalities would provide a predictable and sustainable source of funding for local infrastructure projects without creating a new tax burden on residents or homebuyers; and

WHEREAS a redistribution of a portion of the existing Land Transfer Tax and GST would allow municipalities to better plan and invest in long-term infrastructure initiatives, supporting local economic growth and improving the quality of life for residents.

#### NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

- A. THAT Brantford City Council formally requests the Provincial Government to consider redistributing a portion of the Land Transfer Tax collected on property transactions to municipalities; and
- B. THAT Brantford City Council calls on the Federal Government to allocate a percentage of the GST collected on property sales to municipalities; and
- C. THAT this redistribution of the Land Transfer Tax and GST should be structured to provide predictable and sustainable funding to municipalities, allowing for better long-term planning and investment in infrastructure projects that benefit local communities, thus ensuring that local governments receive a fair share of the revenue to address critical infrastructure needs; and
- D. THAT copies of this resolution BE FORWARDED to Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, Premier Doug Ford, the Ontario Minister of Finance, the Minister of Municipal Affairs and

- Housing, Larry Brock Member of Parliament (MP) and Will Bouma Members of Provincial Parliament (MPP); and
- E. THAT copies of this resolution BE FORWARDED to all 444 Municipalities in Ontario, the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM), and the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) for their endorsement and advocacy.

### 12.2.11 Request for Download of King George Road - Mayor Davis

WHEREAS the City of Brantford adjusted the municipal boundary in 2017 adding 2,700 gross hectares of land, including the lands from Powerline Road North to Governor's Road East to accommodate significant residential and employment growth; and

WHEREAS the City of Brantford Official Plan identifies King George Road, north of Powerline Road, as an Intensification Corridor bisecting two residential Block Plans, known as the Powerline Central and Powerline West block plan areas; and

WHEREAS King George Road, north of Powerline Road is under provincial jurisdiction and referred to as King's Highway 24, managed and maintained by the Ontario Ministry of Transportation; and

WHEREAS the City of Brantford currently owns and maintains a portion of King George Road, south of Powerline Road through a Ministry of Transportation administered program called the Connecting Links Program for critical roadways that serve both provincial and municipal interests; and

WHEREAS the City of Brantford is working with the development community to achieve the City's housing target to build 10,000 new homes by 2031 to support the Province's goal to build 1.5 million homes in the same period; and

WHEREAS the development of the lands within the Powerline Central and Powerline West Block Plan areas, adjacent to the King's Highway 24 corridor will result in approximately 15,000 new homes; and

WHEREAS the King's Highway 24 corridor being owned by the Ministry of Transportation is a constraint for future development due to provincial policies related to setbacks, access, placement of utilities and stormwater management, and will prevent the full urbanization of this corridor; and WHEREAS the location of a planned new east-west major collector road traversing King's Highway 24, identified in the City's Official Plan and Transportation Master Plan, cannot meet the provincial guidelines for access spacing on a provincial highway under the current ownership requirements; and

WHEREAS the relocation of the planned east/west major collector corridor would be significantly impeded by natural heritage system constraints and rolling topography.

#### NOW THEREFORE IT BE RESOLVED:
