Doug Hunt, also known in his entertainment-life as "Doug the Great" is currently the Director of Fund Raising, Marketing and Volunteer Services at Participation Support Services. Formerly Participation House Brantford - PSS is an organization striving to meet the needs of physically disabled adults, seniors in our community, and adults with complex care needs.

Doug has been recognized locally and nationally for many of his achievements.

On October 21, 2023, Doug set a new Guinness World Record for Tallest Stilts ever Mastered. He took 14 independent steps on stilts measuring 55 feet tall. This took place at the 10th Anniversary of the Wayne Gretzky Sports Centre. Doug and his team raised over \$18,000.00 in support of PSS.

September 14, 2002, Doug set a Guinness World Record in Brantford, for tallest and Heaviest Stilts ever Mastered. Doug was able to take 29 independent steps on Stilts measuring 50'9" and weighing a collective 137 pounds.

May 15, 2008, Doug led 625 people (mostly students) on stilts at North Park Collegiate for the Guinness world record for most people on stilts.

September 23, 1998, Doug set a Guinness World Record in Brantford, for tallest and Heaviest Stilts ever mastered. Doug was able to take 56 forward steps on Stilts measuring 50' 5' in height and weighed a collective 126 pounds.





cessful attempt to set a record more than 21 years ago – the right equipment is necessary and practice is essential.

The silo gives Hunt the opportunity to practise ahead of Saturday. It's the same place where Hunt practised before setting a Guinness Book of World Record for stilt walking on Sept. 14, 2002.

Hunt, on that day, walked on stilts measuring 50-feet-nineinches.

The record stood until June 2022 when an American used stilts measuring 54-feet-one inch.

When Hunt attempts to set the new record on Oct. 21, he'll be on stilts measuring 55-feet. His attempt is taking place as part of the 10th anniversary of the major renovation of the Gretzky Centre.

Hunt will be wearing a Brantford Bulldogs jersey with the number 55 on it when he makes his attempt.

The celebration begins at 10 a.m. and continues to 6 p.m. It includes, among other things, a Ferris wheel, free public swimming and skating and a chance to meet Paw Patrol characters Skye and Chase.

"We're really looking forward to the weekend and I hope that the celebration will draw a big crowd," Hunt said. "It's important to remember that we're doing this for a cause – that is we're raising money that will be used to help Participation Support Services."

Hunt said he is being supported by an extensive team that handles a lot of the details including equipment, the logistics, fund-raising.

"We've got more than 20 people with different abilities and skills that we need to help pull this off," Hunt said. "There are a lot of people working behind the scenes on this taking care of all of the details.

"There's more going on than most people can possibly imagine."

Many of the contributions are in-kind donations of equipment that, in dollar terms, would be in the thousands of dollars.

"You can do amazing things, when you're inspired by amazing people and surrounded by amazing people," Hunt said.

Hunt sets new record for stilt walking

History was made Saturday as Brantford's own Doug Hunt set a new Guinness World Record for stilt walking.

Also well known as Doug the Great for his juggling and magic shows, Hunt managed to take 14 continuous, forward steps atop stilts measuring 55 feet in height.

"It was windy," Hunt explained. "They didn't want me to go up at first, but I was tied onto the thing."

A pair of cables were strewn taut between two cranes from Craneway Equipment in Burlington to enable Hunt to be secured with safety straps, and allow him to hold on while he waited for wind gusts to diminish.

"I just needed a few seconds of no wind to get my balance," said the stilt walker. "We got it on the last try before we almost called it."

Hunt originally set the stilt walking record in 2001 in Brantford when he took 29 steps atop stilts that were 50 feet, 9 inches in height.

That record was broken by an American in 2022 on stilts that were just over 54-feet tall.

Christine Taylor of Brantford was among those who came out Saturday to watch Hunt's attempt to regain the record.

"We were part of the original

team," Taylor explained, wearing her father Ron's embroidered denim jacket that was given to team members in 2001. "I was there when he practised in the silo. I was probably about 13 at the time."

She said that with so many world records being made nowadays, it may not be a big deal for some.

"Whether it's big now to other people or not, it's still big to me. It was important that I was here today."

Hunt recalled how, prior to the pandemic he had thought about holding a wine and cheese party to mark the 20th anniversary of his world record.

But stilt walking team manager Dave Levac had another idea.

"'Hell no, you're getting back on the stilts'," Hunt recalled Levac saying to him. "'I'm behind you, and we'll get the steps in because I believe in you'."

"It's not just about balance.", "It's Hunt reminds, about mastering the skills under real conditions and controlled stops (as I walk forward, not falling forward)). I practiced in an 80 foot wide silo on the Pate family Brantwood Farm in Brant with a scaffold built inside to climb to the top of the stilts. It's seriously dangerous and I don't want to harm others. It's a challenge for us, for the team, but challenge became opportunity. I work as the Director of Fundraising Participation Support Services, in Brantford. The folks we support, live with challenges every day, most of us can't imagine that as a permanent lifestyle. We do this event to bring their needs to broader public attention. That is the opportunity that drives us."





High-stepping stilt walker breaks his own world record

That's 29 really tall steps for a man, another little leap in the record book.

A pesky gusting wind couldn't stop Doug Hunt, Brantford's stilt-walker, from going a greater distance on Saturday, and breaking his own accomplishment of walking the most steps with the highest pair of stilts in the Guinness Book of World Records on Saturday.

The daddy-long-legs, dubbed Doug the Great, walked a breath-taking 25 steps on stilts 50-feet, three inches tall in 1998. On Saturday, he was determined to go beyond that at the official positioned between two cranes.

He's on top of the world

t seems Doug Hunt is having trouble coming back down to earth after his record-breaking stiltwalk Wednesday.

With a pungent farm aroma bracing his audience, the 41-year-old Participation House director and part-time entertainer known as Doug the Great, strapped on his enormous stilts for an encore performance Thursday night.

With the pressure of setting the

world's record now lifted, a more relaxed Hunt recreated his historic stilt walk for the media in a silo at Pate's Farm on Powerline Road. He even tossed a few balls to become the unofficial world's tallest stilt jug-

Audience members craned their necks for a glimpse as Hunt teerered on his high tech carbon stilts, measuring more than five storeys high. Easier to see was the enormous shadow cast by the diminutive stiltwalker on the silo wall.

Hunt actually managed a few more steps than his record-setting walk Wednesday but the event was not be-

ing officially recorded.

The Guinness Book of World Records will soon receive notification that Hunt has broken two records — for still height and weight. He managed 54 steps Wednesday in stilts measuring 50 feet five inches high with a combined weight of 126 pounds.

The previous record was held by Steady Eddy Wolf whose stilts measured 40 feet 9/s inches and weighed 114 pounds. That record was broken by Steady Eddy's son Travis in March but it was not worthed for Guippose. but it was not verified for Guinness.

"We've been working on this for two and-a-half years," said Doug's wife Katie, a key player in his 36-member coaching team. "He's been here practis-ing three nights a week since June and riding the treadmill and exercise bike.

It's definitely work."

Disappointed by two failed attempts to break the record last year, Hunt said he was determined not to let the community down.

"I felt a tremendous weight off my back (when I broke the record). We'd promised Brantford we'd break this record. I felt really, really bad in February when I had on those aluminum stilts and I could only get a few steps out of them."

A second attempt in July was scuttled by equipment failure. Despite the disappointment at missing the world's record, these events raised more than \$20,000 for Participation House.

Hunt plans to re-create the stilt walk yet again at a public exhibition planned for next spring or summer.

"We couldn't get Brantford here to see this. But the people have given me so much support and encouragement. I want to do this for them."

World stiltwalking record tumbles

oug the Great has finally walked into the Guinness Book of World Records.

After two failed attempts, Doug Hunt successfully broke the world record for stiltwalking in a farm silo on Powerline Road on Wednesday night.

Watched by a small crowd of family and team members, Hunt actually broke two world records — for stilt height and weight. His carbon stilts measured 50 feet five inches high and weighed 126 pounds. The previous record was held by Steady Eddy Wolf whose stilts measured 40 feet 9½ inches and weighed 114 pounds. Steady Eddy set his record in 1988.

Hunt's first record-breaking attempt was aborted by high winds in February last year and a second try in July, 1997, was scuttled by equipment failure.

Hunt credits a switch to carbon stilts from aluminum for his success. The stilts were designed and manufactured by Tek-composites, which makes

carbon masts for boats from its plant Stoney Creek.

"We learned a lot from the past tempts. With the carbon stilts we know we had the right tools," Hunt said.

Able to take only five steps during lill-fated July stiltwalk, Hunt manag 54 last night, more than doubling t minimum 25 steps required to set t record.

Hunt and his crew had been succesful during practice runs in the sil which was equipped with scaffolding and a concrete floor, and decided make an official try at the record maintain the momentum.

Serving as official counters, as r quired by Guinness Book officials, we Mayor Chris Friel and Arlene Thom of Ayr. An official photograph also w be sent to Guinness for verification.

Hunt will attempt the stiltwalk aga: tonight for out-of-town media. A publ exhibition is planned for next spring of summer.

By the end of 1980s the City was optimistic. The 1990s was predicted to be Brantford's decade. New civic projects were progressing, over 100 new companies had set up shop in Brantford since 1985, and real estate brokers reported that there was an increasing number of people looking to move to and settle in Brantford. Brantford had turned a corner and was confidently expecting an improving economy.

ARTS, CULTURE, RECREATION AND SPORTS

Interior renovations of the Sanderson Centre to restore the building to its 1919 design, which be-gan in October 1989. continued. When the theatre reopened on 8-September-1990 the Expositor noted that it was the "most thorough restoration job in the history of Brantford." The cost

of the restoration, budgeted at \$5.8 million, came in at \$6.4 million, Anne Murray was the headline performer on opening night. The restoration work earned the theatre the 1991 Historic Theatre Preservation Award from the League of Historic American Theatres. The Theatre's diverse enter-tainment offerings and less than ideal size has contributed to its yearly operating deficit. As a City owned facility, it has a mandate to provide a range of entertainment options even if the

market for those offerings is small. Mid-size theatres in North America struggle to cover their operating costs. The City attempted to sell the theatre to private interests in 1993 but no taker could be found.

In 1994, the City received a provincial grant to study the feasibility of a clean up of Mohawk Lake. It was the seventh study conducted of the lake since 1950. The report concluded the lake wasn't as polluted as once thought. Clean up was estimated at \$3.8 million. The City was to receive \$6 mil-lion from the provincial government to clean up the lake and Mohawk Park. This was part of the compensation package when the Ministry of Government Services office was cancelled. The new Harris government cancelled this funding in 1995. Mohawk Park was made fully accessible in 1994. This improvement was funded by donations from 15 local companies totalling \$130,000.

Waterfront Park was built in 1989 by private investors to replace Earl Haig Pool. The water park never did well due to sporadic attendance and rising property taxes. In 1995, the owners of the park agreed to turn over the assets of the park to the City in exchange for a contract to manage the park for ten years. Park profits would be split with the City. In 1996, the management company decided they would no longer manage the park. The City assumed operation of the park and re-named the facility the Earl Haig Family Fun Park.

Plans to construct an authentic 17th century Iroquois village as a tourist

attraction began in 1996. Kanata Village, built across from the Mohawk Chapel, opened in May of 2000. The site was success-fully operated and drew visitors interested in First Nations culture and heritage. The Mohawk Workers group began an occupation of the site in 2007 and attendance declined.

The development of the trail system throughout Brantford began. The Brant Waterways Foundation, the City, the Grand River Conservation Authority, and S.C. Johnson and Son partnered to develop

over 40 kilometres of trails. These trails connected to the Brantford to Hamilton trail built on the old Toronto, Hamilton & Buffalo Railway roadbed, and the Brantford to Cambridge trail, built on the Lake Erie & Northern Railway roadbed. Brantford became a trail hub because of these connections to adjacent communities.

In 1995, Brantford placed first in the Communities in Bloom national horticultural competition for cities with a population between 30,000 and 100,000. The City also placed first for the best planned and maintained floral arrangements. In 1996, Brantford placed first in the Nations in Bloom competition for cities with a population between 25,000 and 125,000. Brantford was the only non-British winner in the competition. In 1997, Brantford took top honours in the Class of Excellence category in the



Communities in Bloom national awards competition. This category was for past winners.

Brantford hosted the 1991 Canadian Games for the Physically Disabled. The event attracted over 350 athletes and involved over 350 volunteers.

On 23-September-1998, Doug Hunt set a world's record for tall stilt walking and heavy stilt walking. Hunt walked 54 steps on stilts that were 50 feet, 5 inches high, weighing a combined 126 lbs. His

"This plan will only drive away more good teachers and create more instability in our schools. The teachers, students and parents of Brant will not stand for this recycled Liberal idea."

The Conservative platform also includes a plan to allow homeowners to deduct up to \$500 a year of their mortgage interest. It's a promise endorsed by Dan Marchuk of the Brantford Regional Real Estate Association.

"I like the concept," Marchuk said. "Home ownership is a dream in Canada and this might give some first-time homeowners the break they need to realize that dream.

"My only question is what is being given up to make this happen."

HELP YOUNG FAMILIES

The proposal will help young families starting out as well as homebuilders, Sokoloski said.

The election platform — called The Road Ahead — also includes help for children with special needs, a tax credit for those who care for disabled children in their home, and increased funding for Early Years programs.

Sokoloski was also pleased to see the government is committed to introducing a tax credit for people taking care of aged, infirm or disabled relatives.

The Tories are also planning to take over responsibility for municipal bridges in Ontario which would benefit

Brant, especially Paris.

Noting that Eves released the platform at an indoor go-kart track, Levac said it showed that the Tories are going around in circles while the Liberals, under Dalton McGuinty, are offering some real direction.

Levac said he is very concerned

about the Tory approach.

He called the platform a "hard turn to the right" that tries to cause a lot of ill-feeling by pitting people against each other.

The PCs, he added, are isolating some familiar targets — Ontario's teachers — and identifying some new

Between 1970 and 1995, there were only two teacher strikes and almost all contracts — about 98 per cent — were settled through teacher-school board negotiations, Levac said.

Most of the disputes involving teachers have occurred since the Tories took power. Instead of looking at their own actions, the Tories have put the blame on teacher's federations and school boards, said Levac.



Doug Hunt didn't make his mark as the world's tallest stilt walker on the weekend, but he also didn't lose his sense of humor either. "Don't drop me, it's too high," he quipped as members of his team carried him on their shoulders for a short victory parallester calling off the record attempt.

he decided to take juggling to new heights. Wearing especially engineered aluminum stilts having a combined weight of 126 pounds, the 42-year-old Canadian stood high inside an 80-foot silo and demonstrated how easy it was to juggle clubs and balls.

Hunt, a longtime IJA member, known local-

ly as "Doug the Great: Entertainer," is the director of fund-raising, marketing, and volunteer services for Participation House in Brantford, Ontario. He staged the event as part of the Bradford Winter Carnival and Telethon, September 23, 1998. Doug and his safety support team had been practicing the stunt for two and a half years, and recognition for the achievement will be published the 2000 Guinness Book of World Records.

Hunt's volunteer credits as an entertainer now include virtually every service club, school, hospital, nursing home and non-profit group in the

Brantford area. Billed as Doug The Great, in 1989 alone, Hunt performed 121 magic shows, more than half of which were donated.

In 1976, Hunt was a member of the steering committee which organized Brantford's first wheelchair basketball team, The Brantford Bobcats. In 1982, he was the assistant head coach of the Canadian Cerebral Palsy team at the fifth International CP games in Denmark. In 1990, he was inducted into the builders' Hall of Fame by the Ontario Cerebral Palsy Sports Association.

This outstanding community service, performed when many others his age were following more selfish pursuits, earned him the Brantford Jaycees' Outstanding Young Citizen Award in 1991. That accolade was soon followed by the Heart and Stroke Foundation Volunteer of the Year Award.

'GIVING GUY'

Tom Rollins worked with Hunt at the Heart and Stroke Foundation and among several people who nominated him for citizen of the year.

"He's the type of person you see at the mall selling flowers for charity," Rollins said. "He is such a giving guy. I admire him for his dedication. If I had to pick someone to model myself after, he would be it. He's a gifted individual."

Director of Marketing and Volunteer Services for Brantford's Participation House since its inception in 1978, Hunt is in his element. Participation House provides physically handicapped adults the opportunity to live in the community. Many of its residents previously lived in large institutions or chronic-care wards of hospitals.

While family commitments to wife Katie and 12-year-old daughter Megan come first in Hunt's life, he remains highly visible in the community, particularly when he's on seven-foot stilts working the crowd along a parade route as Doug The Great.
