WHEREAS an all-way stop location has been requested at Garden Avenue and Grey Street; and

WHEREAS speed Humps have been requested on Garden Avenue north of Grey Street and south of Elgin Street ; and

WHEREAS Garden Avenue is not a truck route but has several violations by trucks every day; and

WHEREAS development in the area has created a significant increase in vehicular traffic on the local streets; and

WHEREAS Council approved the Garden Avenue – Traffic Calming resolution March 23, 2021 and directed staff to conduct traffic studies on Garden Avenue to determine if existing conditions warrant traffic calming; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

THAT Staff BE DIRECTED to send letters to Garden Avenue residents for the purpose of receiving their responses and/or concerns with respect to consideration for all-way stop control at the said intersection and speed humps on the street; and

THAT staff BE DIRECTED to complete all-way stop control warrant studies and REPORT BACK in Q3 2021 with responses from the public engagement and the results of the warrant studies; and

THAT staff BE DIRECTED to review truck route signage on said section of Garden Avenue.

#### 12.2.14 Year of the Garden 2022

WHEREAS the City of Brantford is committed to being a Garden Friendly City, supporting the development of its garden culture; and

WHEREAS the City has a rich tradition of horticultural excellence with more than 180 floral gardens in municipal parks and along City streets, unique mosaic and carpet bed displays as well as annual plantings that enhance public art and historic monuments throughout the community and within the Downtown; and

WHEREAS Equal Grounds Community Gardens coordinates and supports more than 20 active community gardens throughout the City- an initiative that is maintained fully by community residents and volunteers, to provide places for growing local, healthy and nutritious fruits and vegetables in urban neighbourhoods; and

WHEREAS the City is proud to be home to landscapes that demonstrate a growing commitment to environmental sustainability and climate action including an emphasis on water conservation, and the use of native plants and species providing food and habitat for bees and other pollinators; and

WHEREAS gardens and gardening contribute to the quality of life of our municipality and create safe and healthy places where people can come together, and the entire Country is being asked to proclaim 2022 as the "Year of the Garden";

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

A. THAT, the City of Brantford actively PARTICIPATE in the "Year of the Garden" by promoting beautification initiatives, enhancing plantings city wide, encouraging resident engagement and creating a supporting media campaign, and

- B. THAT Staff BE DIRECTED to prepare a plan for 2022 that highlights Brantford's gardening excellence and commitment to environmental sustainability, along with the required budget to be submitted to the Estimates Committee for consideration through the 2022 budget process, and
- C. THAT this resolution BE SHARED with the Federation of Canadian Municipalities, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario, The Member of Parliament and Member of Provincial Parliament for Brantford-Brant, the County of Brant, and all Ontario municipalities.

#### 12.2.15 Waterfront Park

WHEREAS there is a desire to increase the number of public parks in the City that overlook the beautiful Grand River where citizens and visitors can enjoy the beauty of Brantford's natural heritage; and

WHEREAS for many years there have been numerous meetings regarding the enhancement of our waterfront, primarily through the Waterfront Master Plan; and

WHEREAS The City trail system meanders along both sides of the Grand River that runs through our City; and

WHEREAS Improving the access to the Grand River through a series of parks that overlook the Grand River would be ideal resting spots for hikers, bicycle riders and families; and

WHEREAS there would be connections to the Mohawk Lake District, Brant's Crossing and Wilkes Dam areas; and

WHEREAS the City of Brantford acquired lands along Grand River Ave. between Scarfe/Church and Waterloo east of the Grand River and adjacent to the dike trail as an initiative of the Waterfront Master Plan; and

WHEREAS this property consists of approximately 1.25 acres; and

WHEREAS Environmental Site Assessment studies have been completed and \$650,000 in potential funding has been allocated

in the City's ten year Capital Budget to begin the Environmental Risk management Plan in 2022 and design in 2023;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

- A. THAT staff BE DIRECTED to retain a consultant to develop a park design concept and complete any investigative studies required for lands along Grand River Avenue between Scarfe/Church and Waterloo east of the Grand River as an initiative of the Waterfront Master Plan that includes:
  - i. A Vision and concept of the waterfront park project;
  - Public Information Centre(s) to share the vision and concepts with residents and stakeholders and request input to be incorporated into the design;
  - iii. To maximize the view of the Grand River from the potential waterfront park;
  - iv. Parking plan during construction phase and a permanent parking plan for visitors to the waterfront park;
  - v. Provide an estimated construction, implementation and operating and maintenance cost for the waterfront park; and
- B. THAT staff BE DIRECTED to provide a funding source in the 2022 Capital Budget for the consulting services and REPORT BACK to City Council to present the final vision and concept plan in Q4 2022.

#### 12.2.16 Recording of In-Camera Meetings

THAT the following BE REFERRED TO STAFF:

WHEREAS Brantford community members, health and social service providers, and local decision makers all have a role to play

in supporting pregnant women to avoid alcohol during pregnancy and raising awareness that there is no safe amount, no safe type and no safe time to drink alcohol during pregnancy; and

WHEREAS people internationally have observed FASD Awareness Day on September 9 since 1999, and Brantford City Council has observed this day since 2018, we acknowledge that on the ninth day of the ninth month of the year, the world will remember that during the nine months of pregnancy it is important to abstain from alcohol.
